As far back as I can remember, I have enjoyed the art of creating. Even after graduating with a degree in Psychology and business and working in the Social Services field, I still took time to create whether it be crafts or sketching, it was always part of my life. It was important for me to work with a medium that allowed me to start or finish

This was the early 2000's and it was difficult to find pastel portrait artists that taught workshops so I would take oil portrait workshops and make the teachings work for pastel.

With my husband's job, we had the opportunity to live in several states: Pennsylvania, Ohio, North Carolina, Texas, Wisconsin, Virginia, and now South Carolina. This allowed me to meet many artists, join a wide range of artist's groups and find talented teachers throughout the country. I would work every night, after kid activities until 11:00 or 12:00 at night and then find time throughout the day for painting or reading about art.

For me, there is something magical about painting a person, you are not only documenting their journey but you are exploring the creator's handiwork. It never comes easy for me but it is always a rewarding experience. My love of painting people never grows old and I continue to

learn new things and make new discoveries that make me want to paint like this as



long as I can. About 5 years ago, I put aside my oil paints and decided that I want to work only in pastel. I have been fortunate over the past decade to have had a few paintings catch the judge's eyes. Portraiture has become very competitive and to have a painting noticed is a very rewarding feeling. Most notable are Award of Excellence in the Portrait Society of America's Annual Show 2017 and the Prix de Pastel at the International Association of Pastel Societies 2019. While contests and exhibitions can be very rewarding, at the end of the day my goal is to paint each person as authentically as I can and hope that I am able to capture a little of their spirit within the painting and there is no bigger reward than accomplishing that!

What do judges look for in a painting?

question submitted by Scarlett Fleming

- 1. They're looking for paintings that are different.
- 2. Being technically correct is good, but judges will overlook some flaws if the work has a lot of wow factor, and tells a "story". A painting that has a story, will win out over one that doesn't.
- 3. I think judges look for a piece that grabs attention right away, and does so from a distance. Which would probably mean that it has a good underlying design, of values and shapes.
- 4. A painting needs to have an "intent" or main idea. The design, color choices, and marks should all relate to and support that intent.

I hope that helps!



This month the book I'm reviewing is one I found at the library after exhausting all their books on pastels. Interestingly, I am learning a whole new perspective reading art history now. The book I just finished actually offered a ton of insight for this non-classically trained artist.

Techniques of the World's Greatest Painters, Consultant Editor Waldemar Januszczak, was



published in 1980. The last artist included is David Hockney but the format and simple straightforward presentation of techniques was so enlightening. Starting with Giotto in the early 1300s, the author looks at one painting per artist and examines the methods used to create the work. Everything from the ground used to artist's painting posture are considered for the works included. The entries are very short, only a couple of paragraphs for each artist.

For instance, Jasper John's Flag, is composed of three canvases with strips and bits of newsprint. Each star is

unique with some being cut out and set on top of the background and others created as negative shapes within the blue background. Some artists sketch directly on the canvas,

some used cardboard as a ground, some mixed media and others collaborated with multiple apprentice artists. The only thing I wish was that there were more entries.

There is so much to be learned from studying the techniques of other artists which explains why we enjoy workshops so much. Consider finding a book and study it like a workshop.
